An unavoidable reality of online schooling is that there isn't the same social experience, engaging with peers and building social skills and friendships that your child might enjoy at a traditional school.

Virtual schooling also requires a parent to be home with the child while the child is learning, and more parental oversight is needed to ensure that the student is working and engaged. For students who are disorganized or have trouble with self-motivation, online classes may pose a struggle, whereas in a traditional school, teachers and peers help to keep kids on track.

To sum it up, virtual schooling might be an excellent choice for your child if he or she:

- Is a self-motivated learner.
- Doesn't have access to quality school options in the area.
- Wants to learn at his/her own pace.
- Needs to have classes on a different schedule than of that which traditional schools provide.
- Has access to, and enjoys learning through technology.
- Has plenty of social interaction outside of the school day.

Your family might want to rethink virtual schooling and consider more traditional options if your child needs more social interaction and/or interaction with teachers and peers in

a face-to-face setting. This can help kids who struggle with motivation and organization to become more responsible by adapting to those around him or her.
